Librarians at my institution are engaged in campus-wide planning (i.e. serving on academic committees and/or faculty governance groups).		
Librarians receive support and are rewarded for collaborative work in tangible and/or intangible ways (criteria for evaluation, release time, etc).		
Collaboration on campus exists among curricula designers, faculty, librarians, academic advisors, and computing staff.		
Librarians are treated as valued colleagues by faculty and other academic professionals at my institution.		
Librarians actively participate in discussion groups, internal listservs, social networks such as blogs, wikis, twitter and other means of networking with faculty and professional colleagues across campus.		
Academic faculty are receptive to efforts of librarians to collaborate.
